Memories of the Second World War from the Royal Collection – Evacuees

Berkshire was categorised as an Evacuee 'Reception' area due to its rural nature. In the first wave of evacuations, in 1939, 23,915 children were received into the administrative area of Berkshire County Council.

The 14 year old Princess Elizabeth broadcast a message to evacuees as part of the Children's Hour radio programme.

Memories of the Second World War from the Royal Collection – the Guards

On her 16th birthday, 21 April 1942, Princess Elizabeth was appointed Colonel of the Regiment of the Grenadier Guards. This inspection was the Princess's first official public engagement.

The Grenadier Guards are one of the five footguards regiments of the Household Division. The other four being the Coldstream, Scots, Irish and Welsh Guards.

There are two mounted regiments, forming the Household Cavalry – the Life Guards and the Blues and Royals.

During the Second World War the Victoria Barracks housed the various Footguards Regiments of the Household Division, whilst Combernere was home to the Household Cavalry.

Memories of the Second World War from the Royal Collection – VE Day

In her memories of VE Day, when she was 19 years old, Queen Elizabeth II recalled:

'...it was one of the most memorable nights of my life...I remember lines of unknown people linking arms and walking down Whitehall, all of us just swept along on a tide of happiness and relief.'

In her VE Day message, broadcast from Windsor Castle, 75 years after her father's radio broadcast, Queen Elizabeth said,

'Never give up, never despair – that was the message of VE Day
